LITTLE MUSEUM of DUBLIN

15 St. Stephen's Green North (ten minute walk)



Hear interesting Dublin facts and stories from the visit of Queen Victoria to James Joyce to John F. Kennedy, to the worldwide success of Irish rock band U2. Quirky and intimate with amazing things to discover – all donated by the Dublin public.

CHESTER BEATTY LIBRARY

Dublin Castle (ten minute walk)



Rich and diverse exhibitions of decorative arts, manuscripts, prints and drawings from Asia, the Middle East, North Africa and Europe. Spanning centuries, continents and cultures and offering a fascinating view of global artistic heritage. All pieces donated by American mining magnate and philanthropist, Sir Alfred Chester Beatty (1875-1968).

NATIONAL GALLERY of IRELAND

Merrion Square (15 minute walk)



A rich collection spanning the history of western European art from around 1300 to the present day. Includes well-known artists from Mantegna and Titian to Monet and Picasso. Paintings, sculpture, prints, drawings, photography, objets d'art, silverware and furniture.

HUGH LANE GALLERY

Parnell Square North, close to Chapter One restaurant (take a taxi)



Modern and contemporary art in a grand building. Featuring the 'messy' Frances Bacon studio, and the stunning Harry Clarke glass studio. The perfect size gallery – not too big.

HENRIETTA STREET MUSEUM

14 Henrietta Street (take a taxi)



The story of Dublin through one household. Built as a palace, ended as a tenement. Great and sad stories set on Dublin's original Georgian street.

EPIC EMIGRATION MUSEUM

Chq Building, Custom House Quay (take a taxi, it's worth going to)
